

He has shown consistent productivity as a researcher in assessing the role of redox enzymes in pulmonary diseases. including asthma and idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis, with publications in Journal of Cell Biology, Molecular and Cellular Biology, American Journal of Respiratory Critical Care Medicine, and American Journal of Respiratory Cell and Molecular Biology. In total, Dr. Anathy has authored 24 peer-reviewed papers, 18 resulting from his work at UVM since 2004. Dr. Anathy has successfully secured five grant awards as principal investigator from the American Thoracic Society, Parker B. Francis Foundation, Vermont Lung Center COBRE, UVM internal grant program, and the Vermont Genetics Network. He is also a co-investigator for an R01 grant through 2018, Dr. Anathy's research has led to two patent applications, and one was recently awarded both U.S. and European patents.

He also serves as the U.S. principal investigator of an international study of nicotine neuroprotection in Parkinson's disease funded by the Michael J. Fox Foundation. Dr. Boyd developed a deep brain stimulator program in cooperation with neurosurgical colleagues, and through philanthropic donations he is working to create a comprehensive center for the treatment of movement disorders at UVM. Dr. Boyd is also a highly regarded teacher, providing informal bedside teaching to residents and medical students, as well as more formalized neurology and psychiatry lectures.
