What does **VT LEND** do?

VT LEND is part a national Association of University Centers on Disabilities (<u>AUCD</u>) which includes 60 LEND programs.

VT LEND trains professionals, self-advocates and family members to become leaders and systems change agents in the areas of leadership, disabilities, interprofessional practice, cultural competence & systems change.

VT LEND Training Activities

- Successful completion of 2 UVM graduate classes (tuition paid for by VT LEND)
- Participation in Leadership Discussions
- Participation in Mentorship Meetings
- Create a Leadership Goal Plan
- Attend Legislative & Policy Trainings
- Attend National AUCD Conference in Washington, DC
- Required Internship Experience (50-60 hours)

Program Eligibility

- Since VT LEND is a federal grant, trainees and fellows must be US citizens or legal permanent residents, as determined by federal funders
- If you are receiving a different federal stipend, graduate student stipend, graduate student stipend or SSI, please contact VT LEND as the LEND stipend could impact other benefits.

Program Details

- 300-hour program that lasts one academic year (September-May)
- Attendance at AUCD conference in Washington, DC
- Includes 50-60 hours of a required internship experience
- Completion of 2 graduate online & asynchronous courses/6 credits (tuition paid for by VT LEND, trainees/fellows responsible for student fee)

Program Stipend

All VT LEND trainees & fellows receive a small monthly stipend* for the duration of the program.

*Stipend could be impacted by other income sources.
