

University of Vermont Project ECHO Dementia Diagnosis and Care for the Primary Care Team



COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Using the Project ECHO model, this five-session tele-education series will discuss diagnosis and evidence-based care for persons with dementia and their caregivers. The program will identify strategies, best practices, screening tools, resources, clinical pearls, and emerging topics in this field.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES INCLUDE THE ABILITY TO:

1. Describe the current standard of care for screening, diagnosis, treatment, and care of patients with cognitive impairment, AD and other dementias.
2. Identify resources for family caregivers including caregiver supports and assistance in management of caregiver stress.
3. List non-pharmacological and pharmacological approaches to delay disease progression and manage behavioral issues, including adverse effects.
4. Discuss Vermont-specific rules regarding driving, guardianship, and the benefits and process for Advance Directives.

This series is offered at no-cost to participants through a grant from the Vermont Department of Health. Participants can receive 1.5 CME credits for each learning session attended.

About Project ECHO

This program uses the Project ECHO model™. **Project ECHO**® (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) is an evidence-based interactive distance-learning method developed by researchers at the University of New Mexico. During teleECHO™ sessions, experts and peers share their expertise across a virtual network via case-based learning, enabling practice teams to treat patients with complex conditions in their own communities.

Each virtual learning session includes a brief lecture, a case presentation, and discussion. Participants commit to:

- Participate in each Project ECHO case-based learning session, using a virtual meeting platform (see program schedule);
- Use a webcam to participate face-to-face in each session (this is a core element of the Project ECHO model);
- Submit case(s) and present them to the group;
- Complete an evaluation survey at end of each session; and
- Provide requested evaluation feedback at the end of the full program.
